When the advocacy business started, it was not planned to have this business model, but it has worked well. Patients appreciate contributing insight to a study and the payment they receive while other patients in need of our services appreciate our help without being charged. Some of the market research patients also end up asking us to help them out as advocates too."

New Clinical Trial on Chemotherapy-Induced Peripheral Neuropathy

Veloxis Pharmaceuticals (<u>www.veloxis.com</u>) is conducting a new clinical study on CIPN (Chemotherapy-Induced Peripheral Neuropathy), which afflicts nearly half of colorectal patients undergoing chemotherapy. This study was designed to evaluate the safety and potential efficacy to lower the risk of CIPN. Criteria to be included in the study includes:

- 18 years of age or older
- Metastatic colorectal cancer; pathologically confirmed adenocarcinoma of the colon or rectum
- ECOG performance status of 0 or 1
- The most recent laboratory findings (including for liver and kidney) within 14 days prior to randomization remain within acceptable ranges Willingness of the patient and the sexual partner to use a highly effective contraceptive method during the course of the study
- Able to sufficiently understand the clinical study and give written informed consent

Obesity and Neuropathy

Obesity and neuropathy are related in several ways, for example:

- One of the most common complications of obesity is damage to the peripheral nerve system, referred to as neuropathy.
- Obesity (and overweight) is considered one of the most potent risk factors for type 2 diabetes (9). Almost 80–90% of type 2 diabetes patients are overweight or obese
- Diabetes is the leading cause of polyneuropathy in the U.S. About 60 to 70 percent of people with diabetes have mild to severe forms of nerve problems that can cause numb, tingling, or burning feet, one-sided bands or pain, and numbness and weakness on the trunk or pelvis

People, health providers, the public, and reporters, talk about obesity like there is an easy fix. Just change your diet a little, exercise a little and the weight will come off. The reality is that this is not true. Individuals gain weight for a variety of reasons including the medication they take or their illness, to their hormones, or heredity. Obesity is also a comorbidity that makes any other illness you have that much more severe. It is past time to stop blaming the victims and insist that obesity is acknowledge it as a chronic condition.

The rate of obesity in the U.S. continues to rise, including among older adults, and is particularly high among communities of color and historically disadvantaged communities. This presents a challenge to public health professionals and policy makers, who are struggling with the double burden of COVID-19 and rising rates of obesity and chronic disease. With the serious health and financial ramifications of obesity, policymakers should consider increasing investment in obesity prevention and treatment efforts.

The California Chronic Care Coalition (CCCC) is currently working on building a new obesity coalition that will focus on this chronic disease and the NAF recently joined as a founding member of the newly created coalition called the CA Coalition for Recognition of Obesity as a Chronic Illness

(CCROC). The NAF will keep you informed of coalition developments and as always will continue to help the neuropathy community with nutrition, exercise and weight loss ideas and information.
